## **ANIMAL WELFARE**

The Animal & Veterinary Service (AVS) investigates almost 1,200 alleged animal cruelty cases each year across Singapore.

Over 95% of feedback cases arise from disputes, disamenities caused by pets or community animals, or deaths of community animals due to non-cruelty-related reasons such as accidental falls from height, fights among community animals or road traffic accidents.

### If You See It, Report It

Here are some common offences that we investigate. If you witness any of the following, notify us immediately.



## cruelty

Cruelly beating, kicking, ill-treating, torturing, infuriating or terrifying any animal, rashly or unreasonably doing or omitting to do any act that causes unnecessary pain or suffering



#### Illegal importation of animals

Bringing animals into Singapore without a valid import permit



### Failure in duty of care

Abandoning your pets, not providing adequate shelter and food, not seeking prompt veterinary attention for any significant disease or injury



Allowing your pet dog to be at large or not under proper control at public places



### Illegal breeding and sale

Breeding animals at home and selling them for a profit

## Report cases promptly

The sooner we hear about suspected abuse, the sooner we can act to prevent future cruelty. If you witness something, report it immediately while it is still fresh in your mind.



## Provide objective evidence

Video footage or evidence, such as of monetary transactions, can be used as objective evidence to ascertain that an offence has taken place, and enforcement action can be taken accordingly.



### Testify in court

In more severe cases, your voice in court can help us to take enforcement action against offenders and prevent them from committing similar crimes in future.
