Best Visiting Time:

Early morning (before 9am) or evening (after 5pm) when the community gardeners are usually present. Special arrangements for garden visits can be made with the respective Residents' Committee-in-charge.

Garden Visit Etiquette:

- Seek permission from the gardeners before taking any plants or cuttings from the community garden.
- Ask the gardeners for assistance if you like some Pandan and Lemongrass which are grown on the parameter of the community garden. (Help keep the plants healthy for all to enjoy by not damaging them.)
- Gardeners have put in many hours of hard work under the hot sun to grow the crops.
 Return their kindness by offering them seed packs or volunteering to help out with gardening activities.

Plant of Bukit Panjang

The Red Sealing-wax Palm (Cyrtostachys renda), or Pinang Rajah as it is known in Malay, is commonly planted in the estate. This palm earned its common name from its red crownshaft and leaf sheaths, which is the colour of the wax used to seal the envelopes in the past.

Come discover your neighbourhood community gardens





In the 1950s, Bukit Panjang mainly consisted of rural settlements and agricultural areas. Subsequently, kampong folks and farmers were rehoused in new HDB flats and farming opportunities became less available. In recent years, the Community In Bloom (CIB) programme has worked with residents to bring back the kampong spirit. Residents are encouraged to set up community gardens where they can enjoy gardening, as well as bond with their neighbours.

Today, Bukit Panjang constituency is home to more than 11 community gardens specialising in edibles and medicinal herbs. Mayor Teo Ho Pin, the Town Council, Residents' Committees and grassroots organisations support the initiative, working together to keep the kampong and gotong royong spirit alive in modern Singapore.

Vegetables Galore

Bukit Panjang community gardens have a large variety of vegetables and fruits. Some of these are featured below:



Fragrant Leaves



Pandan

Pandanus amaryllifolius

Uses: The leaves are used to flavour a variety of Southeast Asian dishes. They are also used to repel pests like cockroaches.



Cymbopogon citratus

Uses: Their pseudostems, which are sold in supermarkets and grocery stores, are commonly used to cook curries, seafood and poultry dishes. The extracted oil is used in perfumes, cosmetics, skin care products, and therapeutic essential oils.



Common Basil
Ocimum basilicum

Uses: Their fragrant leaves are popularly used in Italian cooking for dishes like pizzas and spaghetti.

Curry Leaf Tree Murraya koenigii

Uses: Their leaves are commonly used in Indian and Chinese cuisines.
