

Good Roadside Gardening Practices





What is Roadside Gardening?

Good Roadside Gardening Practices

Roadside green verges are important public spaces used by your community and neighbours, and thus they should be well maintained, obstruction-free and aesthetically pleasing. You can make your roadside verge a safe and pleasant space by using small, low-maintenance plants, and by keeping your garden neat and tidy.

Tip 1:

Grow a variety of plants with a wide colour palette to create interest and add a pop of colour in your garden.



Tip 2:

Grow ornamental plants that have similar watering requirements near to each other for easier maintenance. For example, succulent plants that require less water can be clustered together.



Tip 3:


Choose small plants that will not exceed 1 m in height to ensure there is no obstruction to visibility between pedestrians and vehicles. Low groundcovers and small shrubs are ideal for roadside gardening.

Tip 4:

Refrain from planting near road junctions as this can obstruct traffic visibility.



Tip 5:

Trim your plants and do housekeeping regularly so that the garden is aesthetically pleasing.



Tip 6:

Regularly remove debris such as disused garden ornaments, plant pots and dried leaves from your garden.



Tip 7:

Avoid growing plants that have an untidy growth habit (e.g., bananas, sugar cane) or placing pots on the walkway to keep the sidewalk clear for pedestrians.

Tip 8:

Avoid plants with thorns, spikes and sharp leaves to reduce the likelihood of injury to people passing by.



Tip 9:

Regularly flush plants that collect water (bromeliads, cocoyams, pitcher plants, etc).



Tip 10:

Loosen compacted soil for better drainage and to prevent water ponding. Check pots and dishes regularly for stagnant water and clear them promptly.



Suitable Plants to Grow

Here is a list of small, low-maintenance plants that are suitable for roadside gardening.
